"Take Heed to Yourself"

Romans 14:1-12 Sept. 25, 2022

I. The Point of Contention Between the "Weak" and the "Strong"

- A. Two opposing contingents had emerged in the church at Rome: the "Weak" and the "Strong".
- B. The "Weak" were Jews who had converted to Christianity.
 - 1. They still felt compelled to obey the Old Testament's laws regarding clean/unclean food/drink and the keeping of various feast days.
 - 2. They felt this way even though they knew that Jesus had technically brough such requirements to an end (Mark 7:19; 1 Tim. 4:4; Col. 2:16-17).
- C. The "Strong", most of whom were Gentiles, were those who did not see the need to keep those earlier Old Testament requirements.

D. Application:

- 1. There's no situation today that directly mirrors the one in Rom. 14.
- 2. Still, there are many matters in which some believers are more permissive than others.
- 3. And our reactions to those who differ from us are often the same as the reactions of those in the church in Rome.

II. The Duties of the "Weak"

- A. Do not pass judgment over the "Strong" don't write them off as hopelessly and dangerously immature and unworthy of fellowship.
- B. Why not pass judgment over the "Strong" in this way:
 - 1. God had already accepted them.
 - 2. They are Christ's servants (as were the "Weak").
 - 3. The "Weak" would one day appear before Christ's judgment seat and give an account of their *own* lives, not the lives of the "Strong".

C. Application:

1. In particular situations today, we can be surprised by the permissiveness of other Christians.

2. We must flee the temptation to write-off our brothers and sisters who feel freer than we do about a certain behavior.

III. The Duties of the Strong

- A. Welcome the "Weak" though not so you can pound them with your own opinions.
- B. Don't despise the "Weak"
 - 1. Don't let yourself become so annoyed that you avoid them altogether.
 - 2. Don't entertain thoughts that would label the "Weak" as legalistic or Pharisaical.
- C. Why not despise the Weak? For the same reasons Paul told them to not pass judgment over the "Strong". (See II.B)

D. Application:

- 1. We sometimes find ourselves sharing a church with those who might have stricter notions of Christian obedience than we do.
- 2. Yet we must flee from the temptation to write them off as moralistic and unworthy of our fellowship.

Summary Phrase: Stop worrying about others and take heed to *yourself!*
